Where are the Pitcairn Islands located?

The Pitcairn Islands (/ˈpɪtkɛərən /PIT-kairn; Pitkern: Pitkern Ailen),officially Pitcairn,Henderson,Ducie and Oeno Islands,are a group of four volcanic islands in the southern Pacific Oceanthat form the sole British Overseas Territory in the Pacific Ocean.

How to get to Pitcairn Islands?

Totegeie Airport in Mangareva can be reached by air from the French Polynesian capital Papeete. There is one 6.4-kilometre (4 mi) paved road leading up from Bounty Bay through Adamstown. The main modes of transport on Pitcairn Islands are by four-wheel drive quad bikes and on foot.

The Pitcairn Islands were formed by a centre of upwelling magma called the Pitcairn hotspot

The island is of volcanic origin, with a rugged cliff coastline. Unlike many other South Pacific islands, it is not surrounded by coral reefs that protect the coast. The only access to the island is via a small pier on Bounty Bay. Adamstown is the sole settlement. Pawala Valley Ridge is the island's highest point at 346 m above sea level. The volcanic soil and tropical climate with abundant rainfall make the soil productive.
